North Little Rock Heat Relief Center

Summer is here and the heat and humidity are back on the rise. Heat and high humidity are a dangerous mix that can contribute to illness and even death.

If your home is not air-conditioned, make alternate plans ahead of time in case of a heat wave. Choose other places to go to get relief from the heat during the hottest part of the day. Such places include libraries, theaters, malls and our own North Little Rock Community Center located at 2700 Willow Street.

On days when the heat index reaches 105 degrees (or more), residents can go to the North Little Rock Heat Relief Center (HRC) at the Com-

munity Center. The HRC will operate from noon until 5:00 p.m. Residents can call 501-340-5454 to determine if the HRC will be open for the day. The Community Center number is 501-791-8541.

While elderly people, folks with health issues, and very young children are the most vulnerable, heat can affect anyone—even strong, healthy athletes. Our bodies are cooled primarily by losing heat through the skin and perspiration. Problems occur when we are unable to shed excess heat. When our heat gain exceeds the amount we can get rid of, our temperature begins to rise and health-related illness may develop. Heat disorders are progressive and should be attended to immediately.

Those who work, exercise, or participate in strenuous activity, such as baseball practice, for an hour or more during intense heat may lose up to two quarts of body water. During hot weather, follow these safety tips:

NEVER leave children, pets, or others alone in closed vehicles. Within minutes, the temperature inside can reach over 140 degrees F which can kill.

Slow down and avoid strenuous activity if possible.

Avoid too much time in the sun. Postpone outdoor activities and games.

Drink plenty of fluids...even IF you do not feel thirsty.

Protecting Your Pet from Summer Heat

As coast-to-coast summer temperatures soar, so does the risk of heatstroke in pets, warns the Humane Society of the United States, the nation's largest animal protection organization.

According to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, three quarters of the nation, from the Southwest to the Mid-Atlantic, face above average summer temperatures in 2012.

"Extreme temperatures can cause heatstroke, and permanent organ damage or even death" says Dr. Barry Kellogg, VMD of the Humane Society Veterinary Medical Association. Kellogg has several tips for avoiding these consequences.



NEVER leave your pets in a parked car. It only takes a matter of minutes on an 85 degree day for the

temperature inside a car with slightly opened windows to reach 102 degrees. Those who see an animal in a car should contact the police or local shelter immediately.

Limit exercise on very hot days to early morning or late evening hours. If possible, walk your pet on grass as asphalt retains heat and can burn their paws.

Protect your pet from heat and sun through shade and a constant supply of fresh, cool water. Dog-houses **do not** provide protection from heat, but only make it worse.

Watch for high humidity. Animals pant to evaporate

moisture from their lungs. If the humidity is high, they are unable to cool themselves, and will become overheated very quickly.

Signs of heatstroke are heavy panting, glazed eyes, a rapid heartbeat, difficulty breathing, excessive thirst, lethargy, fever, dizziness, vomiting, profuse salivation, a deep red or purple tongue, seizure or unconsciousness.

"If your pet has heatstroke, move him or her into the



shade or in an air-conditioned area," says Dr. Kellogg. "Apply ice packs or cold towels to the head, neck or chest or run cool (not cold) water over the pet. Let him or her drink small amounts of cool water, or lick

ice cubes and seek veterinary care immediately."

This summer has been hot...and it doesn't look like that is going to change anytime soon. We have to look out for our four-legged children. Keep them cool, hydrated and safe this summer.

They'll be glad you did!

Summer Fire Safety

Grilling—use grills outside, not in enclosed spaces. Keep the grill away from siding, deck railings and out from under the eaves of the house. Children and pets should also keep at least three feet away from the grill.

Use long handled grilling tools to avoid burns and periodically remove grease from the grill.

In the case of charcoal grills, only use the proper starting fluid. Starter fluid should not be added to already ignited coals.

If you are using a gas grill and smell gas while cooking, get away and call the fire department. Do not store propane cylinders in buildings or garages.



When using a fire pit, keep the fire at least 20 feet away from any building. Never leave the fire pit unattended. Keep a working garden hose nearby, and put the ashes in a closed metal container 24 hours after use.

Lightning—If you hear lightning, use the 30/30 rule. If you see lightning, count to 30. If you hear thunder during that time, the thunderstorm is within six miles. Seek shelter immediately, and wait at least 30 minutes after the last thunder is heard before leaving shelter.

Stop all outdoor activities if you hear thunder, and find shelter. If you are in open water, go to land.

Don't stand under tall isolated trees or tall isolated objects. Stay away from metal or conductive areas like fences.

If you cannot get to shelter, squat down on the balls of your feet and place your hands over your ears with your head between your knees. Become as small as possible. But do not lie flat on the ground.



LIGHTNING SAFE CROUCH



Heat Safety—dress for the heat. Wear lightweight, light-colored clothing.

Stay hydrated. Carry water or juice with you and drink it continually throughout the day. Avoid alcohol and caffeine.

Slow down and avoid strenuous activity. If you must engage in strenuous activity, do it during the cooler morning hours.

Take regular breaks when engaged in physical activity during warm days.

Signs of heat-related illness include cool, moist, pale skin, headache, dizziness, weakness or exhaustion, nausea, vomiting, decreases alertness or loss of consciousness, high body temperature, rapid, weak pulse and rapid, shallow breathing.



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Avoid alcoholic drinks and those containing caffeine. Both promote water loss.

Avoid extreme temperature changes such as taking a cool shower immediately after coming in from hot temperatures.

If you have to work outside, take frequent breaks. Rest in the shade and drink plenty of water.

If your home does not have air conditioning, go to a public building (like the NLRHRC) every day for several hours.

Dress for the weather. Wear loose-fitting, lightweight and light colored clothing.

If you must be outside, cover as much skin as possible to avoid sunburn.

Protect your neck, face and head with a wide-brimmed hat.

Arkansas Tax Holiday 2012



Arkansas's Tax Holiday will be this coming weekend, August 4 and 5, 2012. Retail stores will not charge sales taxes on purchase of school supplies and some clothing. That means shoppers will pay the sticker price for clothing,

accessories and school supplies.

Below are some common questions and answers.

When does it start?

The tax free holiday starts at 12:01 a.m. the first Saturday in August (4th) and ends at 11:59 p.m. the following Sunday (5th).

What items are Sales Tax Free?

Sales tax will not be charged on clothing and footwear if the sale price is less than \$100 per item, clothing accessories and equipment if the sales price is less than \$50 per item and all school supplies, art supplies and instructional material. Accessories include cosmetics, hair accessories, handbags, jewelry, sun glasses, wallets, watches, etc. Art supplies are limited to clay and glazes, paints, paintbrushes, sketch and drawing pads and watercolors. Instructional material includes textbooks, workbooks, and references.

Clothing includes all clothing: footwear, diapers, receiving blankets, wedding apparel, gloves, aprons, hats, neckties, coats and jackets, wedding apparel and formal wear if the marked price is under \$100. It's listed as, "all human wearing apparel," which means it will benefit more than just the back to school crowd.



Computers, software and peripherals are **not tax exempt**.

What about coupons?

A store can reduce the price of an item (i.e., a sale that offers 20% off a \$100 pair of jeans bringing



it below the \$100 per item maximum) and you'll still get the tax exemption. However, a manufacturer's coupon (i.e. a coupon for \$20 off a pair of \$110 jeans) does not lower the actual sale price and therefore the item would still be subject to sales tax.

Is there a limit?



No, there is not a limit on total items you can buy. The only limit is the price **per item limit** listed above. You can buy as many \$99

shirts as you would like and still be exempt. Likewise, you can purchase all your school supplies and back to school clothes together. No matter what the total cost, your items will still be exempt if they meet the criteria listed above.

If one item does not meet the criteria (a \$101 purse, for example), your other items will still be exempt. You will only be charged sales tax on that particular item.



For non-exempt items, is sales tax charged on the whole amount of just the amount over?

If you purchase a non-exempt item, sales tax is charged on the entire amount. For example, all clothing over \$100 is **non-exempt**. If you buy a \$300 suit, you will be charged sales tax on the entire \$300, not just the amount over \$100.

Top 10 Yard Sale Shopping Tips— How to Find the Good Stuff at Yard Sales

You never know what you'll find at a yard sale. It's a different experience every single time you go, and sometimes, you'll go home empty-handed. Nevertheless, you can improve your odds of scoring on your next yard sale outing by following the top 10 yard sale shopping tips.

1. Go EARLY in the morning, as soon as the yard sales start. The good stuff goes fast!
2. Take plenty of cash in small bills, and take more than you think you'll need. Most sellers won't take checks. If you find an unexpected treasure, someone else will likely snag it while you're hunting for an ATM.
3. Plan your yard sale route in advance to make sure you hit the best of the advertised sales. It's a treasure hunt. Think of your route as the map where the X marks the spot—or spots in this case.



4. Watch for yard sale signs, and take the detour if you find one pointing to an unadvertised sale nearby. Unadvertised sales don't get as much traffic, and you might score big. You can pick up your original trail afterward.
5. Drive your largest vehicle or pull a trailer, especially if you're hoping to find furniture.
6. Don't be afraid to haggle when you'd like a lower price. If the seller won't budge, swing back by later in the afternoon—when the sale is about to end and the seller is tired.
7. Don't overlook pieces that just need a little cosmetic work, but beware of costly repairs that exceed the item's worth.
8. Don't head out without packing a yard sale tool kit—a collection of basic supplies to help you make smart, fast burying decisions and get your goods home safely.

9. Imagine how you could use items instead of getting stuck on their original purpose. For example, a piece of iron fencing makes a good headboard or pot rack. You can reupholster chair seats with the good parts of a damaged rug, or use an old chenille bedspread as a tablecloth.
10. Don't buy something if you can't figure out how to use it. It becomes clutter instead of treasure.
